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How to Get Divorce Records

Instructions

Difficulty: Easy

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- 1. Go to the clerk of the court where the divorce case was held.
- 2. Advise the staff person on duty in the clerk's office that you want to obtain divorce records. Typically, a court clerk requires you to complete a records request form.
- 3. Complete the records request form. You provide basic information about the case, particularly the names of the parties_.
- 4. Give the completed form to a staff member. Keep in mind that the records in cases more than a couple of years old may take longer to obtain. The clerk's staff may not be able to provide those records to you for a week or perhaps even a bit longer, according to "The Complete Divorce Handbook: A Practical Guide," by Brette McWhorter Sember.
- 5. Pay the fee associated with duplicating records requested when they are ready for you to retrieve from the court clerk's office.

Tips & Warnings

In many jurisdictions you can request divorce records over the phone or on the Internet. These methods require you to pay for the documents
using a credit or debit card.
